## "Finishing Phobia? The FHW Team Can Help!" Part I

You've just finished turning a beautiful hollow vessel from an expensive chunk of burl bubinga you bought from one of the natives during your recent African safari. Now you are ready to apply the perfect finish. As you reach for the can of "Acme Universal Clear Finish" that you bought at a garage sale 25 years ago, you begin having second thoughts about the wisdom of that choice. After all, you've worked hard to turn that vessel without having it shatter due to a catch; it would be a shame to ruin it now by applying an inferior finish.

If that scenario sounds familiar, come to our February meeting where we will feature several FHW club members sharing finishing tips and demonstrating techniques that will help you be better informed, not

only about choosing an appropriate finish material, but also about surface preparation, finishing techniques, and related safety practices.

We will begin with some essential steps in preparing your work for finishing, including manual and power sanding, dust control and other safety considerations. We will then look at various finishing materials and how to choose and apply the right one for specific applications. Bring your questions and expect some answers!

NOTE: We will continue the finishing topic at a future meeting, at which time we will look at some specialized finishing methods, such as the use of dyes, milk paint, fuming, ebonizing, and more!

#### Meeting Minutes — January 2, 2016

The monthly meeting of the Flint Hills Woodturners began at 9:00 am, January 2, 2016 at Red Oak Hollow Lathe Works, 4025 Walnut Creek Drive, Wamego, KS. Preesident Tom Boley called the meeting to order with 22 people in attendance, including two first time visitors.

Several members brought items for the Show and Tell and discussed the ideas and problems that had gone into their projects.

President Tom Boley welcomed everyone, including two new attendees, and asked everyone to encourage new attendees to come to our meetings.

Randy Zelenka and Bob Holcombe discussed their idea of developing business cards for the club. They felt that a card would be easier to carry and to present to prospective members.

Discussion was also held on how a lathe can hold its value and the reasonable price of mini and midi lathes at this time.

President Tom Boley brought up the openings for Secretary and Program Director, stating that Dan Zeller had volunteered to take the Secretary position and that David Delker would take the Program Director position. He asked if anyone was interested in the jobs. Steve Harbstreit moved to nominate both members and to close nominations. Vote passed unanimously.

Discussion was held on bulk purchases to help the club members. Ned Gatewood stated that the Oneway purchase went well. Lisa Zeller will check into a bulk purchase of CA glue.

Everyone was encouraged to pay their dues for the current year. Vice-President Randy Zelenka and past Secretary David Delker applied for a \$1500 grant from the AAW. The money is to be used for the creation of a library and the purchase of a midi lathe to use at demonstrations and for training purposes.

#### **Officers Reports:**

- President Tom Boley said that Ya Gotta Eat would be held at the Sirloin Stockade. E-mail to follow.
- Vice President Randy Zelenka stated that the grant was submitted on time. He felt that the club would benefit from the purchase of a video camera and tripod. He also thought that the mentoring program was helpful and that he was in his shop on

Tuesday evenings if anyone wanted to turn. He also stated that he had two lathes that could be used.

- Secretary Dan Zeller had nothing to add.
- Treasurer Tom Shields reported that seventeen people had paid their dues. The checking account had a total of \$1192.00. The club made money on the December raffle and that the club had received an anonymous donation of \$200.00.
- Program Director David Delker has been getting ideas from area clubs on what they do for a program. He also asked for ideas from club members as to what they are interested in and what they would like to have for future programs. David will send an e-mail soliciting suggestions. A program on tips, techniques, and jigs was also discussed.
- Operations Director Don Eisele was absent.
- Newsletter Editor Bob Holcombe encouraged members to contribute to the newsletter by letting him know of events, activities, items for sale or wanted to buy. He also said that the AAW has a challenge to member clubs to do a collaborative challenge for the symposium and wanted to know if we would be interested in participating. No decision was made.

### January Demonstration

# Randy Zelenka **Turning a Stemmed Goblet**

Turning end-grain green wood is a challenge in itself. Adding to it a long fragile stem tests the delicacy and skill of the turner. Randy Zelenka pushes both in the January demo.





Randy started mounting the limb between centers.



With the limb mounted in the chuck...



After removing the tailstock, the tool rest is drawn close to the end of the goblet.



Using a spindle gouge, he create a tenon to mount the limb on a chuck.



...he roughed the limb round and removed bark using a spindle roughing gouge.



Turning end grain, Randy used a spindle gouge to hollow inside the cup.



Turning the outside of the cup is next.



The thinner the wall was turned, the brighter the red glow became.



With the cup turned, it was time to turn a stem.



Using a spindle gouge, and very little pressure, he defined the stem.



To turn the cup as thin as comfortable, Randy used a LED light inside.



If a light is not handy, old school calipers work just as well.



To help support the cup while turning the stem, Randy used a "Rubber Chucky". (www.rubberchucky.com)



Turning slowly towards the goblet base.



Sanding the fragile stem lightly.



The stem is finished. The base is last.



Randy only needs to undercut the base slightly to make sure it sits flat and part off the completed goblet. Almost there...



# Tom Boley Workshop at Kansas City Woodturners



Kansas City Woodturners (KCWT) invites two professional turners a year to provide woodturning demonstrations along with a one-day workshop for their members. For their spring session, our own president, Tom Boley, has been invited to demonstrate for them on 20 **Feb.** Tom will be demonstrating three things that Saturday. First will be turning a square natural edge bowl. Second will be turning a natural edge bowl cut on the bias. The third item will be how to turn a plate or tray from thin wood using double faced tape as the chucking method. At the end of those three demos. Tom will talk about turning what he calls a log bowl and sharpening woodturning tools using the Oneway Wolverine and Vari-Grind jigs. The next day, Sunday, Tom will teach a workshop on turning a natural edge bowl cut on the bias and a tray, both of which will have been demonstrated the day before.
