Segmented Woodturning Some Assembly Required!

David Delker will present this month's program on segmented woodturning, which in its simplest form is defined as turning a workpiece consisting of two or more pieces of glued-together wood.

David will demonstrate how to design and build a segmented vessel using readily available lumber and basic woodworking tools. Other topics will include the design process, ranging from graph paper to specialized software, and shopmade jigs to simplify cutting and assembly tasks. He will introduce how to make open-segmented turnings and (his latest passion) woodturned ribbon sculptures.

Segmented woodturning is a perfect next step for woodworkers who have done "flat work" for years and want to transition to woodturning. Creative opportunities are endless, so come prepared to learn about this fascinating aspect of woodturning!



Recap

Today Ross Hirst demonstrated pen making. Ross began with addressing face shield safety, noting the face shields worn by wood turners should meet ANSI Z87.1 standards, which are the standards for high impact usage. ANSI Z87.1 nomenclature is printed only on high impact shields. Ross pointed out there are many pen kits available of various sizes, but he prefers 7mm kits as they are the more adaptable than most sizes and permit more design possibilities. 7mm is the inside diameter of the brass insert used in turned pens. The pen Ross made today was made of wood and a .30-06 cartridge. First, holding the cartridge with a shop made collet, he inserted the brass tube into the cartridge. Epoxy was used to hold the tube in the cartridge. CA glue can fail as it is too brittle. He then drilled out the wood blank while on the lathe, first using a center punch and then a drill bit. The center punch helps the drill follow a straight line instead of following the wood's grain. A barrel trimmer was used to square off the end of the wood portion of the pen. This assures there will be no unsightly gaps where the wood abuts the adjacent portion of the pen. The wood blank was remounted on the lathe using a mandrel, using light pressure between the headstock and the tailstock to avoid flexing. A bushing was placed on the mandrel to act as a sizing gauge indicating the diameter of the finished pen. The blank was rounded with a roughing gouge to the de-

sired shape. The wood was sanded using various grits, finishing with 400 grit sandpaper, and then the pen was ready for finishing. Ross used CA glue (super glue) for a finish. To apply the CA glue, he placed a small bit of CA glue on a piece of paper towel and applied it to the fast turning pen while on the lathe. Several coats were applied. He has found shellac and varnish do not wear well and are difficult to apply to a small piece. Using micromesh abrasives, he sanded the pen to a durable, high gloss, finish. Finally, a pen press assembles the pen barrels, writing tip, and the pen's mechanical mechanisms.

Safety Corner

In September, I wrote about protecting yourself from volatile organic compounds or VOCs. A few of you wrote me to suggest that I try a little less chemistry this month. So I will turn to my other passion: Scouting.

The motto – Be Prepared – isn't just for badges and Scouting. It's for us woodturners, too. You may recall that I had a disagreement with my table saw 18 months ago, which prompted me to start writing this column. It was my quick action and readily-available kit that kept the blood off the carpets in the house. Without turning off another segment of our club's newsletter readership with the gory details, let me focus on the "Be Prepared" part instead.

Your first aid kit for the shop is as important as any other tool or personal protective equipment. We know, despite our best efforts, that accidents will happen in the shop. What you have in your kit could mean the difference between an accident and a really bad outcome. I will also



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add that a first aid kit should not be what you use *instead* of going to the doctor but rather in addition to.

First, the list of contents. You can purchase a ready -made kit almost anywhere, but you may not get all you want and will likely get things you don't need for your shop. If you want a nice case, I suggest using a plastic "parts" case with adjustable dividers since not all items are the same size. A Tupperware container works well too, but you need to keep it organized. If you hurt yourself and you have adrenaline running through your system, you suddenly become "blind" to finding things that may be right in front of you - organization is the key.

The following list of items is from the Mayo Clinic web site, but you can find a similar list from the Red Cross or even First Aid Merit Badge.

- First-aid manual (read first and have handy)
- Adhesive tape (not duct tape, but that works in a pinch)
- Bandage strips and "butterfly" bandages in assorted sizes
- Super glue (you already have some of this in the shop)
- Rubber tourniquet or latex band (you should also have a ¼" dowel to apply pressure)
- Non-stick sterile pads (2", 4" squares)
- Non-stick roller gauze (1", 2", 4" widths) or QuickClot gauze
- Large triangular bandage (may be used as a sling)
- · Instant cold packs
- 1 qt zip-loc plastic bags (2)
- Scissors
- Antiseptic solution and towelettes
- Eyewash solution
- · Sterile saline for irrigation,

flushing

 3% Hydrogen peroxide to disinfect (this ages over time so put the date on it and replace the bottle each year) K

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For one of our "Tips & Tricks" sessions, I will do a few demonstrations on how to do first aid using the First Aid Merit Badge booklet. I promise: no blood, 3rd degree burns, or compound fractures in the demonstration.

Finally, when you have your kit together, here are a few other things to remember:

- Label it
- Put emergency phone numbers, with the location of your shop, on the lid
- Put it in an easy-to-reach place in your shop
- Tell your family where it is

Keep the contents clean and up to date

Keep your tools sharp and your hands away from the sharp parts.
