


Flint Hills Woodturners will have their first Zoom meeting on August 1st at 9am.



The style of this vase is patterned after Longquan Celadon Gu vase of Japan from 12 to 14 hundreds. The principal wood is padauk with rings of dark and light green poplar. The wider rings are walnut with poplar dots. Of interest is the lion mask applied with ink jet transfer.





Patterned after Japanese Satsuma pottery this vase uses two elements – stave and regular segmented. The neck is stave construction of hackberry and purple heart. The body of is swirls of segments consisting of walnut, sapele, cedar and hackberry. Foot and rim are of black limba.

The open seg is not mine. My 17 year old Grand Daughter turned this for her 4H craft project for the Jefferson Co. fair. The vase is 6in tall and 5in at the widest point. Maple, Walnut, and Cherry with wipe on Poly finish.

Round platter is 10 3/4 in dia. Maple with milk paint in the Opeima 2 tool depressions. Finish is 2 coats of Gel wipe on poly.

Square platter is 8 in sq. Cherry with 2 coats of Gel wipe on poly. I started with 3/4 in stock and probably should have used 1 1/2in.

The hollow form is from a cut branch "scab" of Hackberry that was rotted and back-filled with epoxy resin. The bowl is from a three-branch crotch of western red cedar.





Peter's Safety Corner



The summer season brings warm temperatures, high humidity, and for those without air conditioning in the shops, some uncomfortable working environments. If you have an "unconditioned" shop, please be sure you stay hydrated and rest more frequently to avoid overexertion while making your exquisite art.

Warm conditions often lead to a desire to wear looser-fitting clothing, shorts, and cooler footwear. This brings up an important consideration for all woodturners: WHAT NOT TO WEAR.

No, this is not a reprise of The Learning Channel show about wardrobe makeovers, but it is a reminder to consider what you should avoid while working safely in your shop in hot weather. I want to focus on two items of concern: loose-fitting clothing and footwear.

Short-sleeved shirts are welcomed in the shop, particularly in the summer. From the lathe, flying chips and other debris from your work present a limited hazard if your arms are bare. In fact, without a sleeve cuff to potentially get caught in a turning wood block or spindle, it's very safe. Loose fitting shirts, however, could pose a risk. A blowing shirt tail or billowing blouse could find its way around a spinning spindle and pull you into a rotating object, so take care and "tuck it in" or tie it back.

Footwear is another important consideration in the shop, especially when it's hot. So, you've seen your neighbor out with their lawn mower in flip-flops, no doubt. That's not very safe. Give your shop footwear the same considerations. Ideally, the industry standard from the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) can be found here: https://www.osha.gov/laws-regs/regulations/standardnumber/1910/1910.136. No one expects you to read through all the OSHA regulations, but the key message is to wear something that is sturdy and closed over your feet to protect them from falling, rolling, or penetrating sharp objects.

Whether they are sharp bowl gouges or heavy chunks of wood, by falling on your feet, they can do serious damage to you if you are sporting sandals or flip-flops in the shop. If you have steel or protective-toe boots, those would work best, and thick sole will protect you, too, if you step on sharp, penetrating objects like nails or screws.

Proper footwear will also provide appropriate ergonomic support during long hours of standing at the lathe and help reduce back and shoulder pain. A welcome addition to any shop is an antifatigue mat placed where you spend a lot of time standing – it improves your time at the lathe.

Proper clothing and footwear aren't just comfort considerations but are important for shop safety, and, they will contribute to a more pleasurable time that will leave you less fatigued.
