Our June meeting on the 5th will once again feature Tom Boley, this time covering tool sharpening for woodturners. There are so many different tools that it can be rather intimidating for those new to the craft. With bowl gouges, spindle gouges, spindle



roughing gouges, skews, parting tools, scrapers, and all, each with its own shape for the duty it performs, it is important to recognize the differences and sharpen accordingly. Tom will

talk about grinders, grinding wheels, and sharpening jigs as well as how to set up the Wolverine Jig, the most common sharpening jig for woodturning tools. He will demonstrate the difference in tools, talk briefly about their uses, and then how to sharpen each with help from his large set of high speed maple Tom's Tools which he makes for instructors and demonstrators.

May 1st 2021 club meeting minutes

A total of 26 people participated in the monthly zoom meeting including members from the South Kansas Woodturners Club of Wichita.

Reports:

- President – David Delker: The board has been discussing when and how we return to inperson meetings. Case data from the CDC and Public Health Department recommendations for gathering, mask wearing, and distancing are being considered. Likely we will use a hybrid model with in-person meetings for those comfortable with gathering and continue our zoom component for those who wish to participate virtually. This week David will send out a survey to get input on what type of conditions members prefer for gathering. This will help the Board decide how we are going to go forward.

Due to the impending sale of the building where the Club was meeting prior to COVID, when the Club is able to resume in-person meetings, it will need to be in a new location. Those able are asked to assemble at the building at 2:00 pm to help move out all our equipment and supplies. We will need to identify a secure storage location until we find a new meeting location. If members know of a place that would work for our monthly meetings, please contact David Delker. The location should comfortably accommodate 50 people, turning and A/V equipment, and have adequate internet.

AAW is hosting a virtual symposium in July 17-18 with a full slate of activities to include demonstrations, gallery, and products. Virtual symposium of AAW last year was very good. If you go to their site, you can sign up for reminders and updates.

- Treasurer Ross Hirst: The Club's treasury is in good standing.
- Secretary Reminder, due to the first Saturdays of July and September falling on Independence Day and Labor Day weekends, we will move our Club meeting, for those two months only, to the second Saturdays (July 10th and Sept. 11th).
- Past President/Communications If you have problems with links in the emails, let Ray know. A link for the Craft Supplies USA turning video series can be found in the newsletter.
- Member at large-AAW Liaison Tom Boley: Please come to the Bee Shop at 2:00 pm to help move our equipment. Tom will be giving the same spindle duplication, rosette, and grommet demonstration he gave our Club in March for the turning club in Leesburg, VA. If you are interested in watching, let him know.
- VP, Programs, Operations: no reports

Demonstration: Steve Hougham provided information on resin casting demonstration. Safety first: you need to protect your skin, eyes, and lungs from resin and its fumes when casting and turning. Always wear gloves, safety glasses, and use a respirator or air-circulating face shield with an N-95 mask. There are three types of resins: epoxy, polyester and urethane. Steve prefers Alumilite which is a two-part epoxy resin with a 12 min working time. He uses a pressure pot to ensure bubble-free castings. The 12 min working time means the piece must be in the pressure pot by 12 min. There is a very helpful Youtube video by Matt's Woodworks that compares 13 different resins and their casting properties for those interested.

May 1st 2021 club meeting minutes

Alumilite resin mixing is weight based. Use a digital scale that has a minimum sensitivity of 0.1 gram. Other supplies include a variety of stirring sticks (wood or silicone), measuring spoons, and different coloring agents (powder or liquid). A pressure pot (min 40 psi) and air compressor are used for bubble-free casting. Additional equipment includes a vacuum chamber and vacuum pump for resin infiltration, toaster oven, glue gun, and temperature gun.

Steve uses a toaster oven for heating casting molds at 165° and to dry wood at 220°. Wood must be completely dried before casting. If you have punky wood, soak it in Cactus Juice stabilizing resin, put it under vacuum for the recommended time, and then dry at 195 degrees until cured and the weight stabilizes. If you are embedding any objects that have moisture (e.g., pinecones, walnut shells), you must dry them out completely and then coat with MirrorCoat resin before casting. You can make your own silicone molds of wood or other objects to reproduce shapes with resin. Steve uses Alumilite platinumbased silicone rubber products. Be sure to use a mold release spray or wax before using a mold to cast resin. For PVC pipes, Stoner brand release spray works well.

If you do make your own mold and it has an irregular shape, an easy way to determine the volume is to fill it with rice and then pour the rice into your volume measuring cup. That is the total volume of resin you need for that particular mold. Write it on the bottom of the mold so you have it next time. If are using a resin that is mixed by volumes (e.g. 1:1 Parts A & B), fill to half volume with A then the remaining volume with B. If you are using a resin that is mixed based on weight,

zero out your scale with your empty measuring cup first, determine volume with the rice, then fill to half volume with Part A and weigh it. Then add an equal weight of Part B. If you are using a standard shape mold (square or cylinder), there are volume calculators available online.

If you want to add color to your resin and want to have any color separation, you will need to add colorant when the resin is between 95-105°. A temperature gun is nice way to monitor the optimum time for mixing in colors. Turning tools: Carbide tools are thought to be the best for turning resin. Bowl and spindle gouges result in too much chipping. Steve uses a negative rake scraper, or a skew used as a scraper. Finishing: sand, wet sand, then buff. Steve recommends a YouTube video by Jake Thompson on sanding and finishing resin.

Our next meeting will be June 5th with a demonstration of sharpening by Tom Boley.


