Many aspects of the May meeting went smoothly, despite the new location. We had an excellent demonstration by Dr. Charles Barden on tree identification was very informative and well done. We also had a great array of Show and Tell items on display.

That reminds me of one point we need to improve for future meetings: the acoustics in the meeting space are very poor, so speaking into the microphone during Show and Tell time is essential for your voices to be heard. Similarly, questions from the audience during the demonstration did not have the benefit of the sound system. While Dr. Barden's answers were clear, the questions often were inaudible. Future presenters will be reminded to repeat the questions so the audience can clearly understand them.

We continue to seek ways to connect our virtual members to our meetings, despite the inadequate connectivity (no wi-fi and inadequate cellular signal coverage) in the Armory

building. Cellular signal boosters and wi-fi hotspots typically need an antenna outside Potential solutions cost hundreds of dollars, which would only make sense if we have assurance that approach definitely would work. Please let me know if you have expertise in that area or know of local companies who have overcome those problems.

AAW memo regarding fractal burning

AAW issued an important reminder recently about the health risks associated with the "fractal burning" technique (sometimes known as the Lichtenberg process) to embellish wood turnings. The memo from AAW on page 5 goes into detail about the AAW stance on this topic. The recent tragic deaths of two more woodworkers prompted AAW leaders to reiterate this message. Please read it and heed the advice given!

An important point is that we could lose our club liability insurance if we violate the policy on demonstrating and/or showing projects in which fractal burning is used. Please do NOT bring any pieces on which fractal burning was used to Show and Tell or other club events. Failure to comply with this policy will result (as a minimum) in the artwork in question being removed from the exhibit.

Please stay safe in all you do as you enjoy woodturning and encourage others to do the

same! Thanks for helping to spread the word about the risks of using the dangerous fractal burning technique.

AAW Bulletin, June 2022 A Round Up of News and Information from the American Association of Woodturners



From the AAW Safety Committee: Fractal Burning Kills & AAW Reiterates the Dangers

The AAW Board, through its Safety Committee, wants to re-emphasize the dangers associated with the process known as Lichtenberg, or "fractal," burning, an embellishing technique that uses high-voltage electrical current to burn patterns on wood. This often unsafe, life-threatening practice has once again surfaced in the news and on social media, following a two-victim incident in April 2022.

In 2017, the AAW Board of Directors voted to ban any fractal-

burning demonstrations and equipment sales at AAW-sponsored events. The ban prohibits displaying fractal-burned pieces at any AAWsponsored event and promoting the practice via articles in AAW publications. Sadly, since the AAW Board adopted its policy on fractal burning in 2017, there have been thirtythree reported deaths directly attributed to fractal burning, and an unknown number of injuries and close calls.

Learn About the Hidden Dangers

Fractal burning poses a significant hidden risk of electrocution. It speaks volumes that there are no UL-rated fractal burning units commercially available. Many of the YouTube videos that show how to build these devices at home do not adequate-

ly address the inherent safety concerns. Many users think they are being safe, but the number of serious injuries and deaths says otherwise.

AAW Chapters Take Note

The AAW Board's 2017 policy explicitly extends its position to its chapters: **"AAWchartered chapters are strongly urged to refrain from demonstrating or featuring the process in chapter events."** Yet the practice persists at the chapter level. The AAW Safety Committee, with endorsement from the Board of Directors, requests once again that its members and chapter leaders join in the AAW's efforts to discourage the use of fractal burning. Do not promote the practice via newsletter articles or social media posts, and do not allow fractal-burned pieces to be displayed in instant galleries, exhibitions, at chapter meetings, or on chapter websites.

Further, due to liability concerns, the AAW Board has decided to disallow chapters that promote, demonstrate, or allow the use of fractal burning to be eligible to obtain, or renew, insurance through the AAW for their chapter.

Skill Enhancement



It has been a long time since we have been able to have a Skill Enhancement session but now that we have restarted our in-person meetings, we will also restart Skill Enhancement. For those of you who may not know what that means, I will give you some information.

I am Tom Boley and have a shop just off Hwy 24 over toward Wamego. When we started Flint Hills Woodturners, we met in my shop until we outgrew it. However, we still have the two club Delta midi lathes set up there. Since I have three lathes myself, that gives us five lathes we can use for Skill Enhancement. We try to have Skill Enhancement one or two nights a month for members to come work on whatever you wish and we have three or four other members who are able to come to assist. Occasionally we have a focused Skill Enhancement session but they are mostly an opportunity to come work on whatever you wish and we will do our best to help you improve your skills. An example of a focused session would be one or two Skill Enhancement evenings of spindle turning following a demo of spindle turning at a regular club meeting. It is generally better for you to bring your own tools as those are the ones you will use at home and we can help ensure they are shaped correctly and sharpened well. We may even make sharpening one of the key instructional features of our first couple of sessions.

I try to send out an e-mail reminder a few days ahead of each session to ask those who wish to come to let me know you are coming with some idea of what you wish to work on. That way I can better coordinate instructors as well as plan for which lathe you should use. If everyone wants to work on turning large bowls, using the

mini lathes may not work. Skill Enhancement is open to all our club members but we do ask for a \$5 shop fee if you are going to use the equipment. The club collects that fee to pay for things like glue, band saw blades, and other supplies which we may use in enhancing those skills. All are welcome but we can only accommodate five turners at a time on the five lathes. Others are welcome to come and just hang out with us to socialize as well as to absorb whatever lessons you may learn from being around other woodturners. You incur the fee only if you use the equipment. A couple times members have come just to use the band saw to cut their wood into rounds for later use on their own lathes at home and that incurs that \$5 fee. Our sessions normally run from 7pm to about 9:30 and are usually on a weekday evening, Mon through Thurs.

I will include the address and directions when I send out the invitational e-mail for each session. I think you will find this opportunity one which will be of value.

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Safety Corner Revisited

Air Compressor Safety

Last month, our past president, Tom Boley, shared a photo of an air compressor tank that belonged to one of our recent demonstrators, Alan Lacer, which suffered a catastrophic failure after 35 years. I've included that photo for your consideration. From the looks of things, he was very lucky, having suffered only a few minor cuts. One of the



most important observations for you to make is the level of corrosion inside the tank. After years of use, the water build-up in the tank finally won out.

But what can you do to help prevent this unfortunate accident? Every time you compress air, you compress a little condensation out of it too. When that air leaves your tank, it takes some, but not all of the water with it in the form of water vapor (or humidity). If you are a stalwart air brush painter for furniture or cars, one of your worst contaminants for paint can be the water in the air from your compressor, so you may have invested in an air filter system to clean the air from your compressor, which contains not only water vapor but also oil and dust or metal particles.

A typical 20 gal shop compressor, with a 2 HP electric motor, will deliver about 5 cubic feet per minute (CFM) at 90 PSI. One cubic foot is about 7.5 gallons, so in one minute, the motor will essentially fill the tank nearly twice, while delivering 90 PSI air pressure for whatever you are working on in your shop. If you studied gas laws in school, you may remember Boyle's Law that states the pressure of a gas is inversely proportional to its volume at a constant temperature (squeeze a balloon and it expands).


