September 24th

Trivet for the Table





Tom Boley will be demonstrating making a simple trivet for the table. Tom first saw this made about 20 years ago when Reuben Everett of Tidewater Turners in Norfolk, VA, came to Capital Area Woodturners in Alexandria to do his trivet demo. Tom has wanted to make one ever since but just never got around to making the jig for it until about three months ago. Turning the trivet is actually pretty simple, using an 1/8" parting tool as the cutter. The tricky part is making the jig in which to mount the round wood blank so the grooves can be cut. Tom will detail the steps to make the trivet and then show the use of that jig to turn the trivet. Tom will also have a handout for attendees so you can go home and make one yourself.

Interactive remote demonstrations (IRDs) by woodturning artist Rebecca DeGroot inspired me to create some quirky organic forms to bring my project to life.

Our very own club members inspired me, as well:

Heather Marusiak's demonstration and never-ending creativity inspired me to try more advance carving and pyrography techniques to embellish my project.

Tom Shields's Christmas ornament demonstration inspired me to buy a collet chuck system to hold some of the small parts needed to complete my project.

Ross Hirst's pen-turning demonstration inspired me to purchase a mandrel saver gadget that helped me turn pieces for my project that don't even resemble the pen blanks the device was designed for!

There. Those are enough hints about my project for now. As I said, you'll get to see my finished project at the October club meeting. The important message here is that inspiration comes from many sources, and you never know whom YOU will inspire through sharing your woodturning skill with others!

The Board's Plan A is to pass around a sign-up sheet to recruit volunteers at upcoming meetings. Plan B (if Plan A is unsuccessful) will be to make personal contacts via telephone or face-to-face meetings to ask for your help. Plan C (if Plans A and B don't succeed) will be to determine which services we will no longer provide. Yes, we have discussed doing away with the use of AV equipment at club meetings, the Newsletter, and even the website through which we recruit members. You get the picture. We truly need your help if we expect to have a viable club.

Here is the list of duties that we hope you will help us cover:

- **Set up tables and chairs before each meeting.** Board members typically do this, but other volunteers would allow us to take care of other business prior to the meeting and would be much appreciated.

- **Run video camera during demonstrations.** Capture the action during demonstrations, then upload the completed file(s) to cloud-based storage after the meeting.
- **Edit recorded demonstration videos.** Do minor editing of recorded video files captured during club meeting. Would require the use of your own computer and (free) video editing software.
- **Website maintenance.** Our website is Wordpress based, using Elementor as a page builder. This job entails updating website by uploading newsletters, occasionally adding information, and installing Wordpress updates.

Some of these jobs sound quite technical, which indeed they are. Nevertheless, be assured you would have folks helping you learn the ropes as you assumed new duties. I encourage each of you to carefully consider ways in which you can help our club carry out its mission. Don't hesitate to ask if you have any questions about how you can serve your club!

Safety Corner Revisited

With Peter Dorhout

In September, I wrote about protecting yourself from volatile organic compounds or VOCs. A few of you wrote me to suggest that I try a little less chemistry this month. So I will turn to my other passion: Scouting.

The motto – Be Prepared – isn't just for badges and Scouting. It's for us woodturners, too. You may recall that I had a disagreement with my table saw 18 months ago, which prompted me to start writing this column. It was my quick action and readily-available kit that kept the blood off the carpets in the house. Without turning off another segment of our club's newsletter readership with the gory details, let me focus on the "Be Prepared" part instead.

Your first aid kit for the shop is as important as any other tool or personal protective equipment. We know, despite our best efforts, that accidents will happen in the shop. What you have in your kit could mean the difference between an accident and a really bad outcome. I will also add that a first aid kit should not be what you use *instead* of going to the doctor but rather in addition to.

First, the list of contents. You can purchase a ready-made kit almost anywhere, but you may not get all you want and will likely get things you don't need for your shop. If you want a nice case, I suggest using a plastic "parts" case with adjustable dividers since not all items are the same size. A Tupperware container works well too, but you need to keep it organized. If you hurt your-self and you have adrenaline running through your system, you suddenly become "blind" to finding things that may be right in front of you – organization is the key.

The following list of items is from the Mayo Clinic web site, but you can find a similar list from the Red Cross or even First Aid Merit Badge.

- First-aid manual (read first and have handy)
- Adhesive tape (not duct tape, but that works in a pinch)
- Bandage strips and "butterfly" bandages in assorted sizes
- Super glue (you already have some of this in the shop)
- Rubber tourniquet or latex band (you should also have a ¼" dowel to apply pressure)
- Non-stick sterile pads (2", 4" squares)
- Non-stick roller gauze (1", 2", 4" widths) or QuickClot gauze

- Large triangular bandage (may be used as a sling)
- Instant cold packs
- 1 qt zip-loc plastic bags (2)
- Scissors
- Antiseptic solution and towelettes
- Eyewash solution
- Sterile saline for irrigation, flushing
- 3% Hydrogen peroxide to disinfect (this ages over time so put the date on it and replace the bottle each year)

For one of our "Tips & Tricks" sessions, I will do a few demonstrations on how to do first aid using the First Aid Merit Badge booklet. I promise: no blood, 3rd degree burns, or compound fractures in the demonstration.

Finally, when you have your kit together, here are a few other things to remember:

- Label it
- Put emergency phone numbers, with the location of your shop, on the lid
- Put it in an easy-to-reach place in your shop
- Tell your family where it is

Keep the contents clean and up to date

Keep your tools sharp and your hands away from the sharp parts.






