I held that position several years ago; Steve or I would be happy to visit with you if you would like to learn more about the job duties.

We hope that one or more of you will nominate yourself or someone else for the Program Director position. It's a great way to support the club and get acquainted with folks. Note that nominations will be accepted from the floor for Program Director or for any of the other elected positions, for that matter, at the upcoming meeting.

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Thanks for Volunteering!

During our October meeting several members volunteered and signed up for recurring duties at future meetings. A big "thank you" to each person who volunteered, but we still have a couple of "tech jobs" that need to be filled:

- Someone to upload and edit video files for use on website
- Someone to maintain our existing website

Don't worry. There would be ample training and coaching to help you take on those tasks. Let me know if you have questions about what those jobs entail!

On the Move Again!

We've met in the Armory for many months now, but that space has not been ideal. Climate control has been poor, and access to the building has been problematic on several occasions. One of the biggest deficiencies has been the lack of internet access with which to connect virtually with our remote members and to take advantage of future interactive remote demonstrations (IRDs) and other online resources.

Since we resumed in-person meetings, our attendance has dwindled quite a bit. Pre-COVID we often had 40-some members in attendance. During the past few months, attendance ranged from 15 to 25. This pattern is not uncommon, as many woodturning clubs and other groups are experiencing similar declines.

Our smaller group size allows us to move temporarily back to Tom Boley's shop, which we left when we outgrew that space. We will continue to seek a more permanent home, but for now Tom's gracious offer to host our meetings will let us reconnect with our virtual members and focus on the future. Please give Tom a big "THANK YOU" for his gracious offer to use his shop space.

HELP WANTED!

We plan to load up our equipment and supplies and move out of the Armory immediately following our November 19 meeting. We will move the lathe to Tom Boley's

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and we will haul the audio and video equipment to Ray Case's house.

Tom will supply the flat-bed trailer on which to load the lathe. We will haul the remaining gear to Ray's house.

We need several able-bodied volunteers to help load and unload equipment, as well as two or three pickup trucks. Please let me know if you are willing to help with the moving process!

Future Meeting Dates

The December meeting will be on December 17 at the usual 8:30 a.m. for social time, 9:00 a.m. meeting opening at Tom Boley's shop (4025 Walnut Creek Drive, Wamego, KS – we'll send you a map before the December meeting).

Meetings in 2023 will move to the **FIRST SATURDAY** of the month, starting on January 7, 2023. The "first Saturday" meeting pattern is what we followed for years, until we moved to the Armory. The first-Saturday meetings will be easier for folks to remember and those dates will avoid major holidays in 2023.

A Permanent Home



TIPS: WORKING SAFELY

Listen to Your Inner Voice

Working safely helps you to avoid accidents. Here is a tip that anyone can and should use as he or she begins the learning curve of woodturning. In fact it's a technique that, once mastered can be used very effectively in all walks of life.

This simple yet powerful technique can be summed up into a very simple statement, "Listen to your inner voice." This little voice is also known as intuition, instinct, insight, even precognition. It is a subtle but uncanny sense that something isn't quite right. Nine out of ten times a person will disregard this moment of odd feeling and nothing out of the ordinary happens and the feeling fades away. However, the one time that something does materialize out of that feeling, an accident may occur with disastrous unintended consequences.

Think back in your own experience. I'll bet you can remember a time when you or someone you know said something like this. "Ya know, I felt something was wrong just before..." Or perhaps you heard, "I should have listened to myself." Or, "I just knew something was going to go wrong." These are very common exclamations people make when telling the story of an accident they were involved in.

There is a reason why these statements are common. In order to bring this well-studied safety concept to the

forefront, so it may help you avoid an accident, you must accept one important assumption. *These intuitive feelings are not random thoughts. There is a reason why these thoughts develop.* Your job is to figure out what triggered these odd feelings. Fortunately, using this seemingly esoteric safety concept constructively is far easier than understanding the psychology of the concept itself.

Implementing your intuitive sense is simple. Just follow one simple rule. Any time you have an odd feeling that something isn't quite right. Stop the machinery immediately. Double check everything you

are working on and with. Make sure everything is snug, sharp and in its proper place. Once you're confident all is well, then and only then proceed with your project. This routine only takes a few extra moments and you will be surprised how many times you actually find something that is amiss. Remember, woodturning is no fun if you're hurt.




