Safety Corner Revisited

Club member Barbara Drolet shared with me an article from a professional information news feed, ProMED, put out by the International Society for Infectious Disease. If you really want to learn about the world of infectious disease, check out www.promedmail.org.

I still think that woodturning is more interesting, but there are archived reports about industrial work environments and their impact on worker health that are worth looking up.

A number of us turners have been intrigued by the artistic value of epoxy resins and the ability to add color, textures, or other stabilizing agents to our work. Some of these coloring agents are benign dyes that, together with the epoxy dust, should be treated like any other organic dust material.

There are also natural stone or silica stabilizers and thickening agents that can be added to epoxy resins to improve their strength as well as for artistic enhancements. Thickeners like CAB-O-SIL fumed silica or System Three Quartz silica thickener are a few examples. Sanding, grinding, or cutting epoxy containing these will generate potentially hazardous dusts that contain significant amounts of silica that are known to cause a disease called Silicosis.

The ProMED article from October, 2019, examined silica dust exposures from craftspeople who cut, install, grind, or sand "quartz" countertops for kitchens and bathrooms. These countertops are made from mixing silica (quartz) particles with epoxy to form slabs that are then trimmed to fit into new spaces. Unfortunately, the professionals who were studied in this report did not wear proper respiratory PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) and were diagnosed with severe cases of Silicosis. A more severe reaction to a chemical rel- ative of quartz, asbestos, is very well known, and the majority of products on the market do not contain that material.

Sure, silica, quartz, and other mineral additives are natural, so how can they be bad for you? Well, there are just some natural things in this world that don't belong in your body—it just won't react well to them. I recommend that you select the right PPE for your job. The 3M company has a great web site that provides guidance about respiratory hazards and your options for protecting yourself: www.3M.com/respiratory/hazards. Appropriate dust masks with the correct filter are as important as your safety shield and safety glasses when turning or sanding your projects on the lathe.






