Safety, by Example

I do a lot of volunteer work for the Kansas 4-H program, and this time of year I keep busy judging 4-H exhibits at county fairs. I typically judge electronics, model rockets, robotics, computer programming, woodworking, and photography projects. Last week I judged my first woodturning project. The 16-year-old young man had turned a gavel for his retiring club leader, using a piece of apricot wood from a tree branch on that lady's property. He used an old lathe his grandfather gave him and some primitive turning tools (mostly scrapers). The results were quite good, all things considered.

I had a good conversation with the young man, showed him some of my work via my website, and encouraged him to continue exploring woodturning. That brings me to the "Safety, by Example" title of this section. While he claimed to have worn safety glasses while turning his project, he really should have worn a face shield.

I spoke with several other woodworking project exhibitors that had NOT used any personal protection equipment. A few wore safety glasses, but none used hearing or dust protection – even though some of those kids operated a router or compound miter saw! Many exhibitors had been helped/mentored/coached by "Dad" or "Grandpa" and some even admitted that their mentor did not have such safety equipment in their shop.

The moral of this story is that we should always model appropriate safety practices, especially when teaching and mentoring young people. I keep a set of safety glasses and hearing protectors in my cupboard for my grandson to wear when he occasionally works on a project with me. I encourage you to do the same when you are demonstrating your woodturning techniques to others! The behavior





OFFICER REPORTS

SHOW AND TELL

DEMONSTRATION

Steve Bietau gave a program on finials. Most of his are associated with Christmas ornaments. He discussed design and showed examples with a slide show. The golden mean (1.618 to 1) is usually used for sizing length of top and bottom finials.

Various tools and grinds were discussed. He particularly recommended "Finial Chucky" for support of the small distal end as he worked back toward the headstock. (<u>www.rubberchucky.com</u>) He started his turning with a 2" x 2" x 6" maple block, held in a chuck.

The next meeting will be August 5th. The program will be a snowflake Christmas ornament.
