#### AAW 2024 Member Show "Common Roots" Application dates: January 1 to March 15, 2024

The theme for the 2024 AAW member show is *Common Roots.* Each year, our goal is to host a Symposium exhibition that showcases and celebrates the full scope of excellent work being created by our members, from impeccably-crafted 'round and brown' to innovative sculptures that push the boundaries.

As always, artists are encouraged to interpret the theme for themselves, but here are a few jumping off points for getting the creative wheels spinning: "common roots" could refer to our shared connections through craft, culture, heritage, foods, our role in the ecosystem, human community, or roots as symbols of strength or as an actual material.

Work will be selected through a blind jurying process. The entry fee is \$25 for up to three entries. #### Officer Reports:

**President** – David Delker: The Board recognized Mike Ballard for all his efforts to the Club this past year, first learning from Ray Case, and then keeping all the audio/visual going for the meetings. As thanks, Mike received a certificate from the FHW Board waiving his 2024 dues.

David thanked all Club participants, Board members, volunteers, and demonstrators (both in person and IRD) that have helped keep the Club going for these past 3 years during difficult times of COVID restrictions, building infrastructure and expertise to make our meetings accessible to members in their homes through Zoom, losing our meeting space, and moving locations multiple times.

David has updated the website with our meeting location and Club newsletters.

**VP** – Joe Beck: No Report. David reported that the new VP for 2024, Tod Salfrank, will be overseeing the library starting in January.

**Treasurer** – Ross Hirst: The Club bank balance is \$3,453.89 with a petty cash fund of \$20. Additionally, Ross collected \$200 for dues before the meeting started. Not including those just collected, there were 24 paid members thus far. Please pay Ross dues of \$40 by cash, check, or PayPal at <u>fhwtreasurer@gmail.com</u>.

**Secretary** – Barbara Drolet: Congratulations to Club members Bob Holcombe, Tom Shields, and Ned Gatewood for having items selected for the Manhattan Arts Center Wrap-it-up event. Barb also let members know there was a Christmas Card on the silent auction table to sign for the Church.

**Programs** – (Vacant, Delker Acting): Today Vaughn Graber will demonstrate turning a manholecover box. In January David Delker will demonstrate turning miniatures. Tom Boley is next year's program director. He's looking at some bringing in some outside demonstrators, but also needs members to volunteer to demonstrate.

**Operations** – Tom Shields: No report.

**AAW Liaison/Newsletter**– Heather Marusiak: AAW members can save up to \$120 if they register for the annual symposium in Portland by April 5. The deadline to apply for the 2024 Professional Outreach Program (POP) is January 15<sup>th</sup>. The fee is \$25 and the theme is 'Balance'. Entries will be on view starting in March and available in a live/online auction at the Symposium.

If members want to be able to post photos on the page, contact Ray, David, or Heather. The question was raised whether the Club had an Instagram account and Ray reported that no we do not.

**Show & Tell:** Presenters included: Vaughn Graber, Kenneth Stitt, Dennis Biggs, Victor Schwarz, Tod Salfrank, David Delker, Bill Shea, Terry Dixon, and Heather Marusiak.

**Demonstration**: Member Vaughn Graber gave a demonstration of turning a box with a pop-up lid called a manhole-cover box. This idea came to him from a video he saw of Keith Gotschall advertised in a 2021 issue of the AAW magazine. Vaughn started with a 6" x 6" piece of poplar with tapered edges. Information included the use of a screw chuck and Cole jaws, the best shelf size for the lid to rest upon, the angle needed so that the lid will pop up when pressed, considerations for how thin the lid should be, and the required looseness of the fit. Vaughn showed how to texture both the bottom and the top and suggested other embellishment ideas such as using a wood burner, coloring, or texturing with a Dremel tool. The same type of wood or different woods can be used for bottom and top.

Tip of the day – Make a chart of expansion and compression diameters for each position of your Cole jaws.

The next meeting will be January 6<sup>th</sup>.





A total of 35 people attended, including three guests and one person attended via Zoom.

#### **Officer Reports**:

**President** – Tom Shields: Tom welcomed all returning and new Club board officers. In addition to Tom as President, Tod Salfrank is Vice President, Barbara Drolet returns as Secretary, Ross Hirst returns as Treasurer, Tom Boley is Programs Director, Robert Kloppenborg is Operations Director, with Tom Shields assisting with online communications, and Heather Marusiak returns as AAW Liaison, WIT, and newsletter editor.

The Club has a treasury balance (see Treasury report) that can be used to fund outside demonstrators. Whether in person or remote, demonstrators charge \$350 or more. The membership should consider what they would like to see funded by the Club.

**VP** – Tod Salfrank: Tod is now overseeing the library materials. There are a lot of DVDs, but many do not have a player. He is looking into other types of media. He will submit a list to David Delker who is updating our website so members can see what is available in addition to what is posted in the newsletter.

**Secretary** – Barbara Drolet: Barbara reminded the Club that there are a lot of respiratory viruses circulating out there (flu, RSV, Covid, and cold viruses) so members should take care of themselves, consider getting vaccinated, and please do not come to a meeting if they are sick, as we have an at-risk membership.

**Treasurer** – Ross Hirst: The Club bank balance is \$3,850.02. We don't need a large balance year to year, just enough to replace/repair lathe or audio/visual equipment as needed and pay the church (\$25/month, paid quarterly). The Club made \$20 on the silent auction last month and \$476 in membership dues have been received since last meeting. Membership cards are available if you paid and did not receive a card.

**Programs** – Tom Boley: In February Tom will demonstrate turning purse mirrors. In March, we will have an interactive remote demonstration (IRD) by Ron Tomasch. Ron will demonstrate turning a hat. Members should plan to come to the church to watch the IRD together. Due to the length of the demonstration, we will not have show & tell.

**Operations** – Robert Kloppenborg: Meet the Makers event at the Flint Hills Discovery Center is March 12-15. The Flint Hills Festival, also at the Discovery Center, is on May 4<sup>th</sup>. This conflicts with our May meeting. The Board will consider moving that meeting to the second Saturday (11<sup>th</sup>). The Kansas City Woodworkers show is on March 15-17 for those interested.

**Other Business**: Lowell Regehr let the Club know of a Flint Hills Woodworkers meeting on Feb. 8 at 7:00 PM hosted by Dave Suhling (924 Newfoundland St.).

**Show & Tell:** Presenters included: Vaughn Graber, Kenneth Stitt, Tom Boley, Terry Schmidt, Dennis Biggs, Victor Schwarz, Melissa McIntyre, Mike Ballard, Ed Brokesh, Heather Marusiak, and David Delker.

**Demonstration**: Member David Delker gave a demonstration of turning miniatures. Information included using pen blanks as starting material, best types of wood to use, specialized turning tools, how to make your own with 3 mm hardened steel rods, and how to sharpen them. Switching from a face shield to a magnifying head lamp and safety glasses is very helpful once the shape is roughed out. Leaving as much mass at the head stock end as possible will decrease the vibration. David showed how to use double stick tape and unique chucking solutions to hold the small pieces and discussed how to make a threaded face plate/waste block from maple or cherry. David likes to use EEE-Ultra Shine polishing wax to finish his pieces.

Tip of the day – From Ross Hirst: A light coat of CA glue on the threads of a wooden block after tapping will harden the threads and protect them from moisture.

The next meeting will be February 3<sup>th</sup>.

Meeting adjourned at 12:00 PM.




