WIT Wig Stand Initiative, cont'd



Wig stand requirements:

Top: 1 1/2"-2" thick x 5" diameter disk Base: 1 1/2"-2" thick x 6" diameter disk

Stem: 10"-13" x 1.5 x 1.5 block

- Any species of dry wood will work for this project. It may be solid or glued.
- Stand must be smooth and free of any sharp, jagged edges.
- Stand may be naturally finished or artistically embellished.
- Stand must be finished with POLYURETHANE.
- This is an ongoing project with no deadline for completion.

How to Tune a Banjo

After years of service, your banjo may not slide on your lathe's bed as smoothly as you would like. But such an annoyance is easily fixed.

First, scrape the rust and junk off of the lathe bed with a utility blade scraper. Be careful; not much pressure is needed, otherwise you might gouge the relatively soft steel of the bed. Unless of cour se you have a stainless steel bed, as do Robust Lathes. Oh, lucky you. A spray of WD-40, or similar lubricant, helps the scraper do its job. And you may also need to sand the bed using 400 grit sandpaper and WD -40 on a flat sanding block, then smooth it with a scraper.



Next, take the banjo off of the lathe and turn it over. With a piece of 400 grit sandpaper on a flat sanding block wide enough to sand both surfaces at the same time, sand the banjo's bottom. WD-40 helps here too. If you listen closely, you can actually hear the roughness of these surfaces disappear as you sand away.

Both the lathe's bed and the banjo will now be as smooth as glass, and the banjo will slide along freely. Such an improvement.

Maintenance-wise, if you regularly spray some WD-40 or similar lubricant on your lathe's bed and then wipe it off, this will help keep your banjo sliding smoothly. But when rust and other stuff build up on your bed, you'll need to take the steps described above. It'll take only a minute to keep your banjo sliding freely, and you'll be so glad you did.

Demonstration - A demonstration was provided by Club member Bob Holcombe on turning a calabash bowl. A very informative handout detailed the rich history and tradition of these bowls which feature a round bottom, with no foot, typically turned from green wood so that it warps slightly, imitating traditional bowls made from gourds in the pacific islands. Information included specific proportions of the three different forms, types of wood used, best practices for preparing and mounting the green wood bowl blank, how to avoid making the bottom too flat, and Bob's preferred shaping tools and finishes. Bob highly recommends Richard Raffan's YouTube channel as a great resource for turning bowls.

*Tip of the day was from Bob Holcombe: Bar Keepers Friend cleaner works well to remove any black marks left by your tools when turning wet wood.

The next meeting will be July 6. Meeting adjourned at 11:55 AM




From Wamego:

Please park and enter the building through the door by the greenhouse.











Mentoring Opportunities
