WIT Wig Stand Initiative, cont'd



Wig stand requirements:

Top: 1 1/2"-2" thick x 5" diameter disk Base: 1 1/2"-2" thick x 6" diameter disk

Stem: 10"-13" x 1.5 x 1.5 block

- Any species of dry wood will work for this project. It may be solid or glued.
- Stand must be smooth and free of any sharp, jagged edges.
- Stand may be naturally finished or artistically embellished.
- Stand must be finished with POLYURETHANE.
- This is an ongoing project with no deadline for completion.

As we all know, some wood is much more weather resistant than others. Inside, we use whatever looks best for the application. But outside, where the snow, ice, heat, cold, rain, snow, and sun works on it 24 hours a day, some of those woods we may use inside just don't hold up. So, it is good to know which ones are weather resistant.

As a woodturner, you may well find that a neighbor or friend will ask you to make a replacement outdoor baluster for him, perhaps a finial on the porch, or even a spire on top of the house. You simply must know which wood will be best for outside use because your customer probably won't. The most weather resistant ones are black locust, Osage orange (hedge), red mulberry, and yew. I have never seen yew in actual boards so am not sure how practical that would be. Even finding black locust and Osage orange in lumber form which you could glue up may be difficult. So, the next level of weather resistance is cedar, redwood, white oak, sassafras, juniper, catalpa, and bald cypress (old growth). Most of those are available as lumber and can be glued up to the size you need.

The next level will include white pine, honey locust, longleaf pine, and bald cypress (young growth). Those are considered moderately weather resistant with the final category being only slightly to non-weather resistant. Examples of that last category are alder, ash, basswood, beech, birch, buckeye, hemlock, hickory, maple, re oak, pine, poplar, and sweet gum. Don't use those for outside.

Many turning jobs require larger pieces than available in lumber stores. That means buying lumber, cutting it to size, and glueing up larger blocks. When glueing up for outside use, be sure to use a waterproof glue such as Titebond III. No matter what wood is used, though, it should be further protected from the weather by paint or some other finish suitable for outdoor use. Left unprotected, even weather resistant bare wood will weather far sooner than you would expect. While finishing the wood is usually the responsibility of your customer, be sure to explain the need for proper finishing. As an added measure, I always suggest to my customers that they should put at least one coat of finish on the ends of outdoor pieces because the end grain is more vulnerable to the weather than the side grain. A bit of extra attention before installation will extend the service life of your work quite a bit.

Secretary – Tom Boley is subbing today for Secretary Barbara Drolet but has nothing to report from that office.



The next meeting will be August 3rd, 2024. The meeting was adjourned at noon.


















































Please park and enter the building through the door by the greenhouse.











Mentoring Opportunities
