Open Call for ALL to Participate: WIT Wig Stand Initiative

The AAW Women in Turning is encouraging all chapters to join in a national project to turn wig stands at no expense for the recipients. The wig stands are donated to local partnering organizations that give away free wig stands to those in need. The partners may be hospitals, oncology clinics, cosmetology programs, or other organizations that support people undergoing cancer treatment. The goal is to give back to our community, especially as cancer has likely impacted each of us, our family, or our friends.



Wig stand requirements:

Top: 1 1/2"–2" thick x 5" diameter disk Base: 1 1/2"–2" thick x 6" diameter disk

Stem: 10"-13" x 1.5 x 1.5 block

- Any species of dry wood will work for this project. It may be solid or glued.
- Stand must be smooth and free of any sharp, jagged edges.
- Stand may be naturally finished or artistically embellished.
- Stand must be finished with POLYURETHANE.
- This is an ongoing project with no deadline for completion.

FHW Meeting Minutes, Aug 3, 2024, 9:00 am at Rock Creek High School, Saint George, KS.

A total of 18 members attended in-person and three attended via zoom.

Officer Reports:

President – Tom Shields: Today's demonstration will be Tips and Tricks and unusual tools by several members. Members were encouraged to check out the silent auction table.

VP – Tod Salfrank: The Club A/V volunteers are trying to improve our signal for those members who attend meetings via zoom. Everyone's patience is appreciated.

Treasurer – Ross Hirst – The Club treasury balance is \$3319.91 with \$38.51 in petty cash. Expenditures last month were for the donuts.

Programs – Tom Boley: Today is "Tips, Tricks, and Unusual Tools". Next month Tom Shields will demonstrate turning a Christmas ornament. Having this demonstration in September will give members plenty of time before the holiday. This demo may include a skill enhancement evening to follow. In October, Steve Bietau will demonstrate hollowing. In November, Tom Boley will do a spindle demo. Likely there will be two evenings of skill enhancement for members to practice their spindle turning. In December we will have an interactive remote demonstration by Rudy Lopez. Topic is still to be determined.

Operations – Robert Kloppenborg: The Pumpkin Patch Arts and Crafts event is Oct 12th (9 am to 5 pm) on Poyntz Ave, Downtown Manhattan. We are looking for volunteers.

AAW Liaison/WIT/Newsletter— Heather Marusiak: Absent, no report.

Secretary - Barbara Drolet: No report.

Show & Tell: Presenters included: Vaughn Graber, Dennis Waite, Robert Kloppenborg, Tod Salfrank, and Dennis Biggs.

Demonstration – Tips, tricks and unusual tools were presented by Tom Shields, Steve Bietau, Bob Holcombe, and Tom Boley. Tom S. discussed the challenges of turning a large platter, or in this case a large lazy Susan. He enlarged his face plate and used a cone on his tailstock for a more secure chucking set up, discussed finding the center, and using a block of wood with glued-on sandpaper to sand the large surfaces perfectly flat.

Steve showed the handles he had made for hex wrenches. They are especially useful for the many pieces of equipment that have set screws. He also showed a good use of old rubber floor mats by gluing them to popsicle sticks and securing sandpaper on them with a hemostat to sand the inside of a hollow vessel.

Bob showed the pre-cut PVC pieces he uses to set the proper distance on his wolverine grinder with CBN wheels. He also showed his custom-made chucks for the wooden scoops he makes, and how you can make your own spindle sander by adhering sandpaper to a dowel and suspending it between centers on the lathe.

Tom B. discussed the versatility of Rubber Chucky products, how to mark and organize your sanding disks/paper, the use of a sizing jig to ensure you are turning the correct size tenons for your jaw chucks, how to clean your lathe bed after turning wet wood and the use of a shade or shower curtain to protect other equipment when turning wet. He also advised smoothing tool rests with a file, wearing a glove on the hand closest to the wood, starting new work with a slow speed, cleaning out your morse taper center, and signing your work. Other tips included keeping a list of what you give away, to avoid repeats, making cardboard circles to use as bowl blank templates for your band saw, using a bucket with PVC pipe for storing and transporting turning tools, keeping an extendable magnet handy for dropped metal objects, and the use of old jointer blades to make custom scrapers.

The next meeting will be Sept 7.

Meeting adjourned at 11:15 AM.
















From Wamego:

Please park and enter the building through the door by the greenhouse.











Mentoring Opportunities
