A total of 31 people attended, including four guests.

Officer Reports:

President – Tom Shields: Guests were welcomed including the guest demonstrator. The Club Board will be meeting sometime this month to discuss whether to continue with our website. Any decisions will be related to the Club at the next meeting. Members were reminded to check out the silent auction items.

VP – Tod Salfrank: There will not be a monthly meeting on May 3rd due to the Club's participation in the Flint Hills Festival in Manhattan.

Secretary - Barb Drolet: No report

Treasurer – Ross Hirst: The Club treasury balance is \$4100.67 with \$21.16 in petty cash for a total of \$4121.83. Income for the past month included membership dues, skill enhancement, and donuts.

Programs – Tom Boley: Today Jim Garner from Kansas City Woodturners will demonstrate carving basket weaves designs in hollow forms. In June, Bob Holcombe will demonstrate turning scoops and spoons. In July, Kris Coyan, KC Woodturners President, will demonstrate turning boxes. August remains TBD. In September, KC woodturner Phill Sikes will demonstrate hollowing enclosed forms with bowl gouges instead of hollowing tools. Oct – Dec remain TBD. Tom is still trying to get Rudy Lopez to do an in-person demonstration with workshops.

Operations – Steve Bietau: Meet the Makers at the Manhattan Discovery Center last month was very successful. Steve thanked the volunteers. A signup sheet was passed around for volunteers to set up, tear down, turn, and talk with the crowd at our next event, the Flint Hills Festival on May 3rd. Typical crowds at that event range from 5000 to 7000 people so we have the potential to reach a lot of people.

AAW Liaison/WIT/Newsletter– Heather Marusiak: And as mentioned earlier, we need a volunteer to start doing the newsletter. It is currently being done with PowerPoint and it could be as complicated or simple as this volunteer wants it to be. As mentioned last month, it would be good if this person volunteered soon so they can overlap with Heather in the next couple of months before she leaves. We also need someone to become the AAW liaison and member-at-large for the board. Heather will be here for the July meeting so that will be the last day to get wig stands to her.

Other Business:

Tom Boley has black cherry logs available at his shop.

Show & Tell: Presenters included: Dave Davis, Dennis Biggs, Robert Kloppenborg, Tom O'Grady, Tom Boley, and Lowell Regehr.

Demonstration – Jim Garner from Kansas City Woodturners demonstrated how to carve turned hollow forms to give them a basket weave look. A handout was sent to Club members ahead of the meeting with photos and instructions. Demonstration information included recommended vessel thickness, designs, preferred tool types and brands, and types of wood. Once he has turned a vessel, Jim uses the indexing feature on his lathe to make vertical lines at 15-degree increments, then rotates the piece and makes the horizontal lines about 1 cm apart. He then uses a punch to mark where lines intersect followed by drilling 1/8" holes at each intersection. He uses a small chisel or file to make each hole square. Once all lines are erased, he draws lines between holes to make the alternating weave pattern. Carving is done with a 5 mm chisel. These lines between holes can be horizontal/vertical or drawn on the diagonal to give a different weave look. Any sharp edges on carved areas are softened with sanding using a detail or mini sander. The thicker the vessel wall, the more three dimensional the carving can be to make the wood really look like it's going under and over. Jim likes to use Shine Juice, Tung Oil, Hard Wax Oil or Howard's Feed-N-Wax as his finish.

Secretary's note: Recipe for Shine Juice as described on World Wide Woodturners: Mix equal parts of boiled linseed oli, clear shellac, and denatured alcohol. Only mix a small portion because the alcohol will escape and reduce the solvent portion. Keep in a Mason jar, stored upside down. After storage, if it feels too thick, add a little alcohol.

The next meeting will be June 7th.


From Manhattan:

Take HWY 24 East toward Wamego to Flush Road. Flush Road is 5.7 miles from the McCall/HWY 24 intersection and is flagged with a speed limit of 60 mph. Go left (North) on Flush Rd for 7.2 miles.

From Wamego:

Take HWY 24 West toward Manhattan to Flush Road. Flush Road is 7.3 miles from the KS-99/HWY 24 intersection and is flagged with a speed limit of 60 mph. Go right (North) on Flush Rd for 7.2 miles.

Please park and enter the building through the door by the greenhouse.






Mentoring Opportunities
